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"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11 NIV)

wonder what Jeremiah would have felt like as he encountered this promise from God. Jeremiah had a prophetic career that was made up of proclaiming God's truth into a culture that had twisted the things of God into something else; something that no longer honoured God or took seriously his command to protect the most vulnerable within society. Those in power had rejected the notion of placing themselves under God and instead they had set up themselves as Lord's over all things; responsible to none and answerable to no one.

What a difficult environment that Jeremiah had been called to work in; persecuted by some, ignored by many. I wonder if there were days where Jeremiah lamented, questioning the purpose of enduring such work in an environment where

his message was met with mass apathy.

To him then I imagine that God's declaration that he had plans for Judah, plans that would see his people prosper, to have hope and a future; would have been precious. God's affirmation to Jeremiah was that the faithfulness of the faithful, during a time of cultural rejection of God would help bring about a future where the nation would once again see itself as God's people.

God's word to Jeremiah I imagine would have been, "I know it's hard. I know that your faithfulness as my witness may at times seem pointless, as the world around you rejects both me and the message you proclaim, but trust me when I tell you that it will not all be for naught. Jeremiah, a time will come where the work of the faithful during this meagre time will cause the harvest to reap many multitudes of that which was sown".

What a wonderful promise!

The truth for you and I, is that we live in a culture not so different from the one which Jeremiah was born into. And like Jeremiah perhaps we wonder if there will be a future of faithful people of God in our world.

We might wonder in the future, who will be left to take up the faith? Will there be anyone left to inherit the legacy that for 2000 years has been passed from one generation to the next?

God's word to Jeremiah is also for you and me and for God's Church in the world today.

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

My dear brothers and sisters, my prayer for you in 2013 (and into the future) was that we might begin to rediscover we are a community that exists with hope for a

future; not one that looks towards tomorrow with dread and despair.

Jesus said to Peter

"And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hell will not overcome it." (Matthew 16:18 NIV)

Peter's faithfulness to Jesus and his message was a foundation stone on which all future generations of the Church were built. Our faithfulness now becomes part of that foundation on which all future generations of the Church will stand. The promise to Peter now stands for us and not even hell itself will overcome the Church in our world.

There is a future for God's people in our world and in the generations to come and that is the promise which we hold onto with hope during the meagre seasons. May you be blessed knowing our faithfulness during difficult times, enables in God's time, an abundant harvest to take place!

Be blessed my dear brothers and sisters. Live in the Church and the World as a people who are assured that what was passed onto us will be passed onto others in the Future.

And may the Peace of God which passes all understanding keep our hearts and minds guarded in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen!
