Chairman's Message Keith Sichler

he bible verses on the right are some of the most well known of all and I know we all have this in our heart. At times though our logical head can be in a different place and put our focus on different priorities.

I know our church budget is at the forefront of many people's minds right now, as we seek to meet our ever increasing expenses. Each year we seem to struggle through financially, just managing to make ends meet.

Each year at our AGM, the Church Council asks you to dig a little deeper and make a larger contribution through your weekly offering.

Each year we revisit our fundraising strategies and come up with new ways to bridge the widening gap between income and expenses.

It is a familiar and well trodden path, but is our head not listening to our heart and leading us in the wrong direction?

With an ageing and diminishing workforce, the numbers are against us and if we continue to tread our current path, I believe we will eventually fail.

If we have learned anything from Pastor's sermon series on God's messages to the Seven Churches in the Book of Revelation, it is that loving and serving God, and loving and serving our fellow man is our sole purpose and mission. No compromise. Clearly, we must actively follow and implement these two most crucial instructions which Jesus first spoke of in Mark 12:33 and Matthew 22:37-40. We must put our faith into practice.

In many ways, we do strive to achieve this, but there are also many opportunities this past year and in previous years through baptisms in particular, that we have let pass for one reason or another. We have not followed up on many of the interactions we have had with people to initiate, strengthen, or renew their relationship with us and through the work of the Holy Spirit, initiate, strengthen, renew that special or relationship with Jesus.

We need to pray that the Holy Spirit guides us to see clearly how we can fulfil the mission we have been given.

We need to pray that the Holy Spirit helps us focus less on our budget blues and instead helps us concentrate more strongly on our relationship joys. We need to pray the Holy Spirit guides and assists our actions and helps us re-direct our efforts.

When we concentrate our efforts on finding budget solutions we are simply acknowledging the symptom and not the root cause. We are diverting ourselves from our true mission. That is why I am suggesting that if we put that same effort into developing processes to attract and retain people whom the Spirit constantly brings to our door, then we will be blessed and 'other those secondary symptoms' will disappear.

Our focus and effort needs to be redirected into 'numbers for Christ' not the numbers in our bank account.

Can we do it?

Are we willing to listen to our heart rather than our head?

Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and uumuumuumu all that night the Lord drove the sea back with a strong east wind and turned it into dry land. The waters were divided, and the Israelites went through the sea on dry ground, with a wall of water on their Exodus 14:21-22, NIV

right and on their left.

can't imagine the intensity of emotion that the people of Israel experienced as God freed them from slavery in Egypt. Through a period of intense struggle and hardship; God battled Pharaoh to liberate the people he had chosen. With each proclamation of God's power and authority, Pharaoh's heart was hardened and for the Israelites each step closer to freedom seemed to make their burden of slavery heavier; until finally God overcome and Pharaoh did allowed God's people to leave.

What a moment of intense Joy this must have been for the Israelites as they marched out of Egypt towards a land, a home, which God had promised them. And yet in an instant this Joy turns to terror as their path seemingly ends with an insurmountable obstacle in front and a quickly advancing army to the rear. To go forward was a death sentence; no one could survive swimming across such a large sea, but to turn back meant slavery once again.

Few could know the fear that the Israelites must have felt at that moment. But we all know what fear feels like in the face of an obstacle and yet God made a way for the Israelites through the heart of the obstacle not only to bring

them safely to the other side, but that they also might see and experience the goodness, love and power of their God.

As a church community we very often live and exist between obstacles; Surrounded by barriers which seem insurmountable. As our attention turns to the obstacles, fear begins to creep in.

When that happens fear starts to become the force that directs our decisions.

Fear stops us from being real with others because we are scared they might reject us.

Fear stops us desiring renewal in our own lives and the life of our community because we are scared it might hurt or cost too much.

Fear keeps us from stepping out into the unknown because we are not certain if God will be there to catch us if we fall.

Fear holds us back from dreaming of a blessed future.

And so we stop seeking to change, we stop desiring to grow deeper in conformity with Christ; we stop wrestling with sin; we stop seeking freedom and deliverance in our lives; we stop looking for our joy in the things of God and his kingdom;

and instead we carve out a comfortable place, between death and slavery as we wait for one or both to overtake us.

Friends, Christ did not win us freedom so that we might live in fear. Paul writes 'So you have not received a spirit that makes you fearful slaves. Instead, vou received God's Spirit when he adopted you as his own children. we call him, "Abba. Now Father."' (Romans 8:15 NLT). We can and are called to take hold of this reality!

This year we pray that the Holy Spirit might deepen his work in our hearts that we might grow into our inheritance.

When that happens fear will start to give way to trust and we will begin to see with ever greater clarity the Love the Father has for each of us.

My hope this year, is that our hearts might become thirsty for God and we seek a greater presence and influence of Him in this place.

God has a future and a plan for us. Let's be bold and step into that promise. I won't say that it will be easy or that it won't come without a cost. But what I can say is that God will bring us through every obstacle that we face on the journey. We will not be overcome!

> We have been blessed with the attendance of a small but regular group of children who have grown closer to each other. This has strengthened their relationships and friendships. We have also been blessed with some new children attending during 2014. Sadly one of our families has moved away from Whyalla. This has left us with a big hole as not only did we lose a child, we also lost a leader.

> Faith Inkubators, Bible Song material has been used again during 2014. We completed the Good News series which covered the birth, ministry, death and resurrection of Jesus. In the latter part of the year we started the Songs of Israel series however due to a computer problem we have since ceased that series and have started 2015 with the Books of Moses.

> Using the Bible Song material enables children to learn bible stories through art, music and Children freely movement. share their lows and highs in a respectful atmosphere and then pray for each other. The bible is also used regularly and each child is given their own bible that they can then use and mark as they like. We also bless each other at the end of our session. Being physically blessed by the children and helpers at the end of our session is such a powerful recharge!

During the vear а congregational survey was distributed over a couple of weeks suggesting some alternative names for our children's ministry. This came about because some members felt that "Faith Kernel Events" did not explain what we did to the outside community and as we are advertising regularly in the Whyalla News Community section we needed something that told people what we were about. A Night at the Bethlehem Inn Keith Sichler


e all know what happened at the back of the Inn that first Christmas, but what did the people in the Inn know? Were they aware? Did they even suspect?


The Prodigal God by Timothy Keller
