COFFEE & CHAT


his is quite a fun group to be part of and comprises a wide range of women, of differing ages and experiences. The only criteria is that you are a woman who likes a chat.

Some of the money we donated went to \$ 150 to Plas Prai Cambodia, \$500 for Christmas hampers for Centrecare, and \$360 for Lifeline Coast to Coast from Mite Boxes

In July birthing kits were put together. Α combined Churches Fellowship Birthday Celebrations at St Teresa's was attended by seven ladies. Our ladies voted to donate \$1,500 to the congregation for repairs to the manse and a donated \$1,350 to the congregation to cover the cost of an Engineers report on the structural integrity of the sinking foundation at the south west corner of the church building.

Six ladies attended the Combined Fellowship Advent Service held at the Uniting Church.

Our final Christmas wind up was well attended by 16 members, six guests, Pastor Tim and five very willing and able male kitchen helpers.

Our Guest Speakers were Lynette Steele from the library and Trudy McNicol who showed us how to make greeting cards. If we don't have Bible Study or a Guest Speaker we enjoy having a chat.

Our meetings are held in member's homes during winter and this is greatly appreciated.

Our ladies generously give of their time to contribute towards our fund raising.


